Letter to our shareholders

Dear Shareholders,

after a decent first quarter, the second quarter has connected seamlessly thereto. Both positive and negative deviations in the individual subsidiaries have kept roughly in balance, so that we can look back on a satisfactory first half 2016 in total. Greater sales declines from the area Telephony and somewhat lower sales from the EEG tariff for wind farms were offset by increasing sales in the segment HVAC.

While we assume that we have now reached a level of sales in the ICT segment, that we intend to defend at least and expand on again in the medium term mainly through cloud-based solutions, we expect from the segment Renewable Energies relatively stable sales from the fees under the EEG and possible sales leaps through M&A activities.

Sales growth in the HVAC segment was slightly weaker than planned in the first half 2016, as it was the case in the fourth quarter 2015. Especially in online trading, the rapid growth rates in previous years could not be maintained. Through a variety of measures that have since been implemented or initiated, the push in this area was recently increased again, so that we are confident to be able to return to the sales growth of previous years in the medium term.

Approval for the wind farm project Schlenzer under the Federal Immission Control Act obtained

After the wind turbines in the wind farm Lüdersdorf II, planned and set up by 3U ENERGY PE GmbH, with a total capacity of 6.6 MW were connected and put into full operation at the beginning of May, 3U ENERGY AG registered another corporate success at the end of May: The approval for the wind farm project Schlenzer under the Federal Immission Control Act. The authorization procedure under the Federal Immission Control Act is a very challenging process, because all environmental impact of an installation must be considered and assessed. The approval is the most important milestone in the whole process of a wind farm development project. Developed by 3U ENERGY PE GmbH, the wind park project consists of two to be erected wind turbines each with a rated power of 2.75 MW, a hub height of 139 m and a rotor diameter of 120 m.

The project management for the construction of the wind farm is carried out by 3U ENERGY PE GmbH. The foundation for the wind turbines is to be laid in August and the delivery of the wind turbines is scheduled for the end of October. The start of operation should take place at the end of 2016 or the beginning of 2017.

Exploratory talks that could lead to a sale of a wind farm will be conducted with interested parties. An earnings contribution in the fourth quarter is expected from this.

Review of the Annual General Meeting 2016

This year's Annual General Meeting took place in Marburg on May 25, 2016. There had been intensive contact with shareholders ahead and we took the opportunity to explain our strategy for the further development of 3U.

After a sometimes controversial debate all resolutions of the Annual General Meeting, incl. the discharge of the Supervisory Board and Executive Board, were adopted by a large majority as well.

The trust expressed in us at the AGM is confirmation and obligation at the same time. We will increase the profitability in the second half and with that we are well on the way to meet the expectations of our shareholders.

We would be delighted if you continue to join us on our track.

General market development

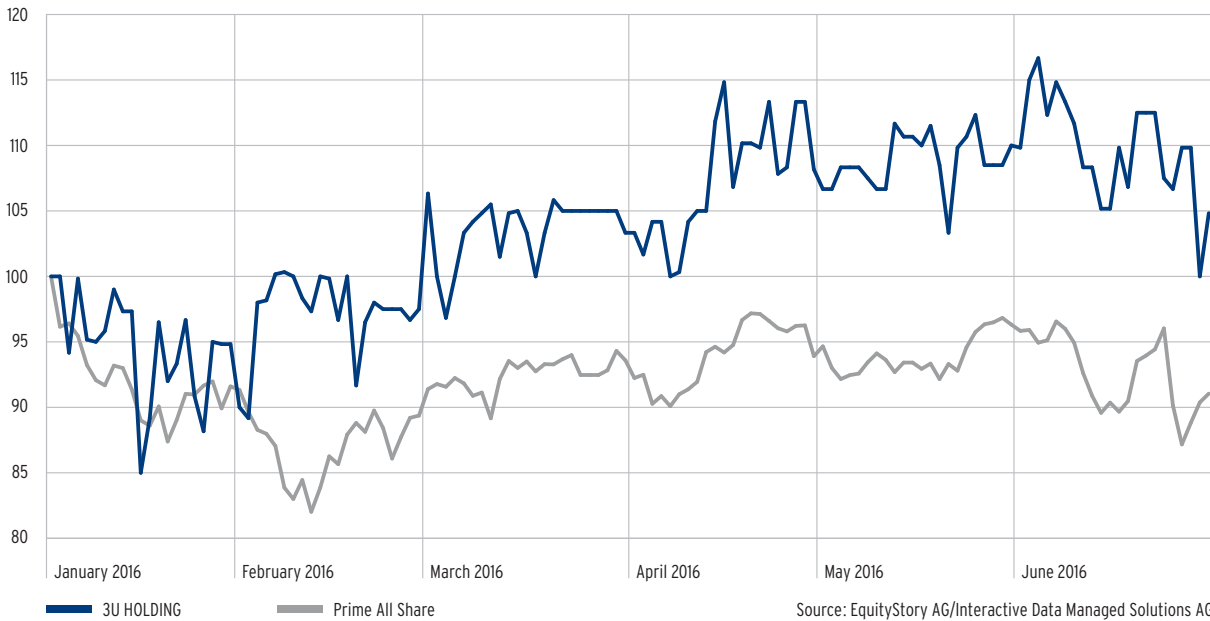
In the first half of 2016, geopolitical events, such as the ongoing conflicts in the Ukraine and the Middle East, determined trading on stock exchanges worldwide. In addition, there were terror attacks in Paris, Brussels and Istanbul. The economic situation in Asia and resulting developments on commodity markets – particularly the low price of crude oil – also led to price declines. By contrast, the continued expansionary monetary policy of the European Central Bank (ECB) and positive economic growth in the USA yielded positive signals. The referendum to the so-called Brexit was also a particularly striking event. On June 23, 2016, the majority of Britons voted for the Brexit. After this surprising outcome of the referendum, it came to turbulent price movements on the international financial and currency markets in the aftermath.

Development of the 3U share

The 3U share was weak at the beginning, but was able to recover significantly during the quarter and hold the slightly elevated level in the aftermath. Starting with a quotation of EUR 0.60 the 3U share gained 3 Eurocent under significant fluctuations until midyear, which represents an increase of almost 5 %.

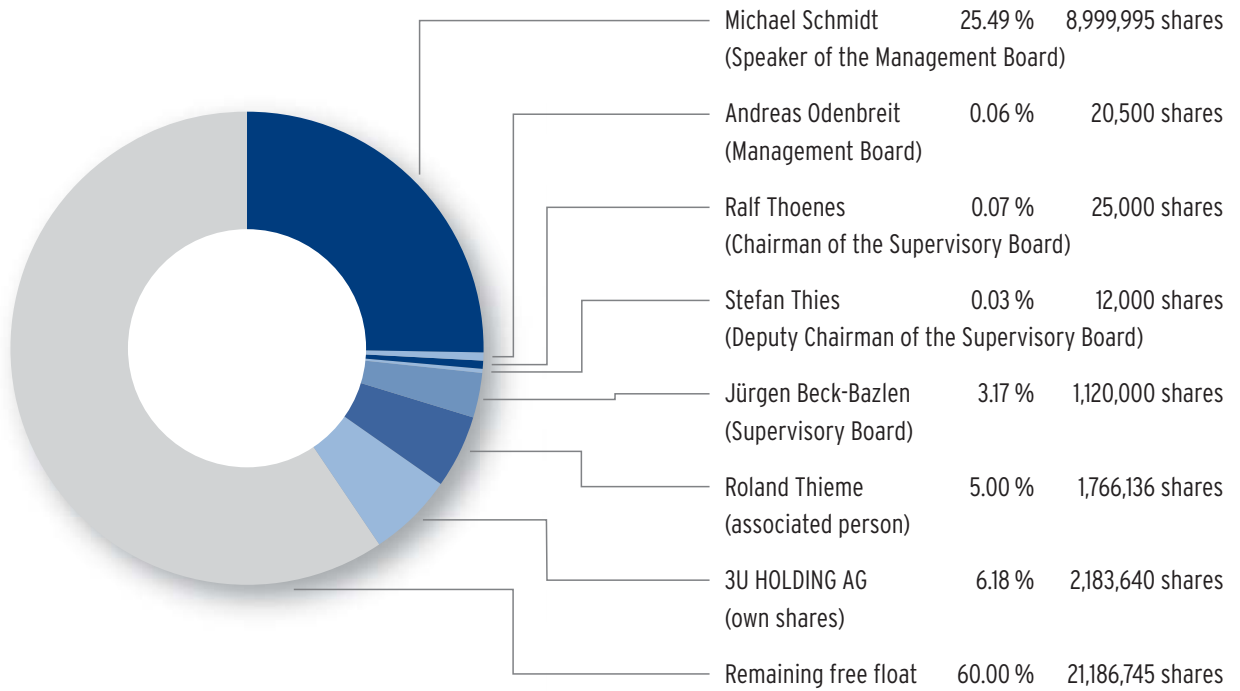
The Prime All Share Index developed in line with the other German indices. Starting from the 2015 year-end level at 4,232.17 points, it fell back significantly by mid-February only to slightly recover thereafter under high volatility and to end the first half at a level of 3,853.26 points. This corresponds to a loss of around 9 % since the beginning of the year. The outperformance of the 3U share vs. the benchmark Prime All Share Index is thus almost 14 % in the first half-year.

Investor relations

The dialogue with our shareholders has a high priority for us. Throughout the year Investor Relations is available to all capital market participants for substantial information and pursuing a comprehensive capital market supervision, which is based on the principles of timeliness, continuity, credibility and equal treatment.

The fixed dates for the regular reporting set the framework for the capital market communication. The start of the year forms the publication of the consolidated financial statements for the previous fiscal year. The key financial data of the fiscal year and a forecast for the following year shall be made public in advance.

3U HOLDING AG informs the capital market over the past reporting period, about six weeks after the quarter ends. Important Group figures may be made public in advance as well. The related reports are available on the Investor Relations pages of the website of 3U HOLDING AG.

We keep an intense dialogue with our investors. The most significant group of shareholders are the private investors of 3U HOLDING AG. They make up the largest number of investors. The investor relations pages of 3U HOLDING AG serve as a central and practical center for them. The website is constantly modernized and updated and provides, among other explanations for strategy and business development, all current publications and an annual report archive that goes back to the foundation of 3U HOLDING AG in the year 1999.

Moreover, there is the option of direct contact with the Investor Relations section. At the annual general meeting, all shareholders have the opportunity to get a picture of the 3U HOLDING AG and experience the Supervisory and Management Board live.

The liquidity of the 3U share has dropped even more compared to the previous reporting period. The average daily number of traded 3U shares in Frankfurt fell in 2016 to around 13,000 after an average daily number of almost 19,000 3U shares were traded in the same period of 2015.

8 Corporate governance report

The German Corporate Governance Code has been applicable since 2002. It was updated in May 2015 and contains regulations, recommendations and suggestions for good and responsible corporate management. The purpose of the Code is to create greater transparency, thus increasing the confidence of investors, customers, employees and the public in the corporate management of German companies. 3U HOLDING AG welcomes the provisions of the German Corporate Governance Code (GCGC), which serves the interests of the companies as well as its investors.

Declaration of conformity

The Management and Supervisory Boards of 3U HOLDING AG discussed continuously the contents of the Corporate Governance Code at length and decided that the recommendations are largely observed.

3U HOLDING AG submitted the most current declaration of conformity required according to the German Stock Corporation Act on March 1, 2016. It can be viewed permanently on its website (www.3u.net) under the path "Investor Relations/Corporate Governance".

Deviations from the recommendations

Deductible D&O insurance

The D&O insurance of the Company does not contain deductibles for the Supervisory Board. Regarding this, 3U HOLDING AG thinks that the responsibility and motivation with which the members of the Supervisory Board of the Company perform their tasks cannot be improved by such deductibles.

Diversity

In the allocation of managerial functions the Management Board acts according to the requirements of the respective function and searches for the person who fulfils these requirements in the best possible way. If several candidates of similar qualification are available, the Management Board looks for diversity and an appropriate consideration of women in the Company in the allocation without elevating those criteria to an overriding principle.

Executive remuneration

The Supervisory Board has not stipulated a cap for compensation to be paid to Members of the Management Board (max. 2 years' salary) because the contracts have only a limited period of 3 years. Accordingly, the proposed limit of possible compensation claims of Board Members as intended with 4.2.3 is already inherently included in the employment contracts of the Board Members.

Diversity for members of the Management Board and Supervisory Board

The Supervisory Board chooses the members of the Management Board according to suitability and qualification and looks for the best composition possible for management positions. The Company is of the opinion that the special weighting of further criteria predetermined by the code would restrict the choice of possible candidates for the Management Board. Furthermore it has to be considered that the Management Board consists of just three members at this time.

The cast of the Supervisory Board is chosen according to suitability, experience and qualification as well. To follow other guidelines for choosing suitable members would restrict the flexibility without gaining other advantages for the Company. This is true all the more since the Supervisory Board currently consists of only three members.

Corporate Governance Statement

In the declaration, the relevant corporate governance practices applied beyond the legal regulations are explained. It further describes the workings of the Management Board and the Supervisory Board and presents the composition and working methods of the Management and Supervisory Board.

10 Fundamentals of the Group

Business model of the Group

Originating from the telecommunications industry the 3U Group operates in the three rearranged segments ICT (Information and Telecommunications Technology), Renewable Energies and SHAC (Sanitary, Heating and Air Conditioning Technology) since January 1, 2016.

The segment ITC comprises the activities Voice Retail, Business Voice and Data Center Services & Operation. Within Voice Retail products like open call-by-call, pre-selection and call-through are being offered. The products voice termination (Wholesale, resale) and value added services are grouped as Voice Business. The products collocation, Infrastructure as a Service (IaaS), telecommunications services and the operation of networks and installations make up Data Center Services & Operation. In addition this segment comprises the development, distribution and operation of cloud based CRM and ERP solutions, the trading of IT licenses and consulting concerning management systems based on ISO 27001 as well as IT security.

In the segment Renewable Energies the 3U Group essentially covers the wind power project development and electricity generation with own plants using wind and solar energy.

In addition to the assembly of components of air conditioning in buildings, the distribution of products from sanitary, heating and air conditioning systems to wholesalers, craftsmen and self-builders belong to the segment SHAC. This distribution is carried out via the Group's online stores.

Until December 31, 2015, the activities of the 3U Group were assigned to the segments Telephony, Renewable Energies and Services.

As part of the restructuring of the IT organization, IT operations was assigned to the previous segment Telephony instead of the previous segment Services. With the discontinuation of the operating activities of sales and marketing activities for external customers and the restructuring of the IT organization, the segment Services continued to lose importance within the 3U Group. In addition, there were substantial intersections between the segment Telephony and its business unit DCS and the segment Services with its business area cloud computing which made an assignment to two different segments obsolete.

The combined activities in the hitherto existing segment Renewable Energies came mainly from two fields: Renewable energy in the narrow sense and the business range HVAC. Participations that used to be active in both areas in the past and thus formed a common basis have no more relevance. The activities in HVAC (heating, cooling, and ventilation) are reported as a new segment SHAC (Sanitary, Heating and Air Conditioning Technology). In the segment Renewable Energies remain the project development in the field of wind power and electricity generation with own plants.

Corporate management

The structure and organisation of the 3U Group are subject to continuous review and improvement. Ongoing adjustments of the organisation structure thereby guarantee clear responsibilities. The competencies within the monitoring, planning and control system are thus clearly defined. The monitoring and planning system mainly consists of the monthly management information reporting and the risk reporting. In addition there are regular meetings between Management Board and Managing Directors of the Subsidiaries as well as a monthly Forecast-/liquidity development.

The control system is based around sales planning, EBITDA and Group earnings goals for the following twelve months respectively. The planning for the two subsequent financial years is done based on the detailed planning of the first year plan. The assumptions for sales planning are analyzed on the respective levels of the Company; regulatory plans, the capital market outlook and industry trends flow in at market level. Changes relevant to earnings within a component are communicated directly between the Management Board and heads of division in the form of immediate reporting. The organizational structure and the elements of the control system thus form an integral mechanism between strategic and front-line business levels.

Report on business development

Earnings

Group sales

Group sales fell slightly compared with the same period last year (first half of 2015) by EUR 1.24 million from EUR 22.53 million to EUR 21.29 million in the first half of 2016. Sales in the segment ITC and Renewable Energies declined while sales in the segment SHAC slightly improved. The segment SHAC accounted for 48.3 % of sales, while the segment ICT contributed 40.1 % and the segment Renewable Energies 11.3 %.

The other internally produced and capitalised assets are in connection with the commissioning of the project Windpark Lüdersdorf and its assignment to the fixed assets of the 3U Group. As a result there is the negative change in stock or stock reduction in the segment Renewable Energies.

The cost of materials was reduced by EUR 1.19 million in total compared to the same period last year. In relation to sales the cost of materials fell slightly in the segments compared with the same period last year. The proportion of material expenses from sales is 59.0 %, while it was 61.1 % of sales in the previous period. The other operating income was significantly lower compared to the same period last year.

EBITDA

EBITDA improved again compared to the same period last year. While EBITDA in the first half of fiscal year 2015 amounted to EUR 1.84 million, EBITDA reached EUR 2.37 million in the first half of fiscal year 2016. The increase in EBITDA compared to the same period last year is due to lower personnel expenses and in particular lower other operating expenses. Higher expenses for external consulting and support services had contributed to high other operating expenses in the previous period.

Even if the EBITDA of the first quarter 2016 could not be reached, EBITDA in the second quarter of fiscal 2016 was well above the average EBITDA per quarter of fiscal 2015 (EUR 1.00 million).

Group earnings

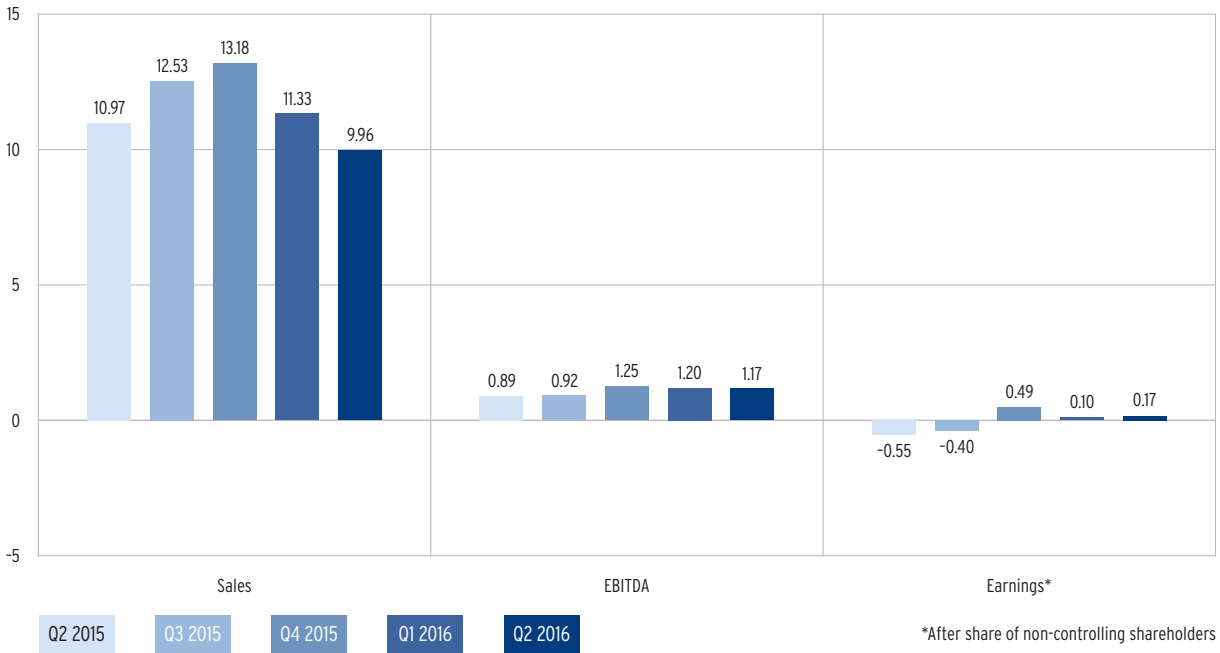
Earnings for the first half of fiscal year 2016 amounted to EUR 0.27 million and was EUR 1.18 million higher than Group earnings in the comparison period (EUR -0.91 million). In the second quarter of fiscal 2016, consolidated earnings amounted to EUR 0.17 million as in the previous two quarters, positive quarterly earnings were achieved.

There is still a low general level of interest rates. As a consequence the interest rate level has improved within the interest-bearing debt of the 3U Group in recent quarters. As a result, negative financial earnings weakened slightly compared to the same period.

The tax income for the first half of fiscal year 2016 amounted to EUR 0.09 million and was thus EUR 0.36 million higher than in the comparative period. A significantly positive impact had it the recognition of deferred taxes due to the utilization of loss carry forwards.

Earnings attributable to the non-controlling interests decreased over the comparable period to EUR 0.04 million. Here, the acquisition of the remaining shares in Selfio GmbH, not yet held by 3U until December 31, 2015, had a positive effect.

In accordance with internal reporting, 3U Group covers the segments ITC, Renewable Energies, SHAC and Holding/Consolidation within its segment reporting since the start of the business year 2016. The comparative figures have been adjusted accordingly to the rearranged segment structure.

Following, the different segments are reported including the sales between segments. Beyond that it needs to be noted that taxes on income and earnings are carried by the parent company, 3U HOLDING AG, as long as subsidiary conditions exist.

Segment ITC (Information and Telecommunications Technology)

Segment sales

Sales in the segment ITC decreased again from EUR 10.12 million to EUR 8.53 million during the reporting period compared to the same period last year. The decrease in sales stems from the area Telephony while in the areas of cloud-based solutions, and trade in IT licenses, sales were somewhat extended.

The additional percentage increase in margin in this segment is partly due to the expansion of activities in the areas of cloud-based solutions and trade in IT licenses. But also Telephony with further focus contributes to an improvement in margins.

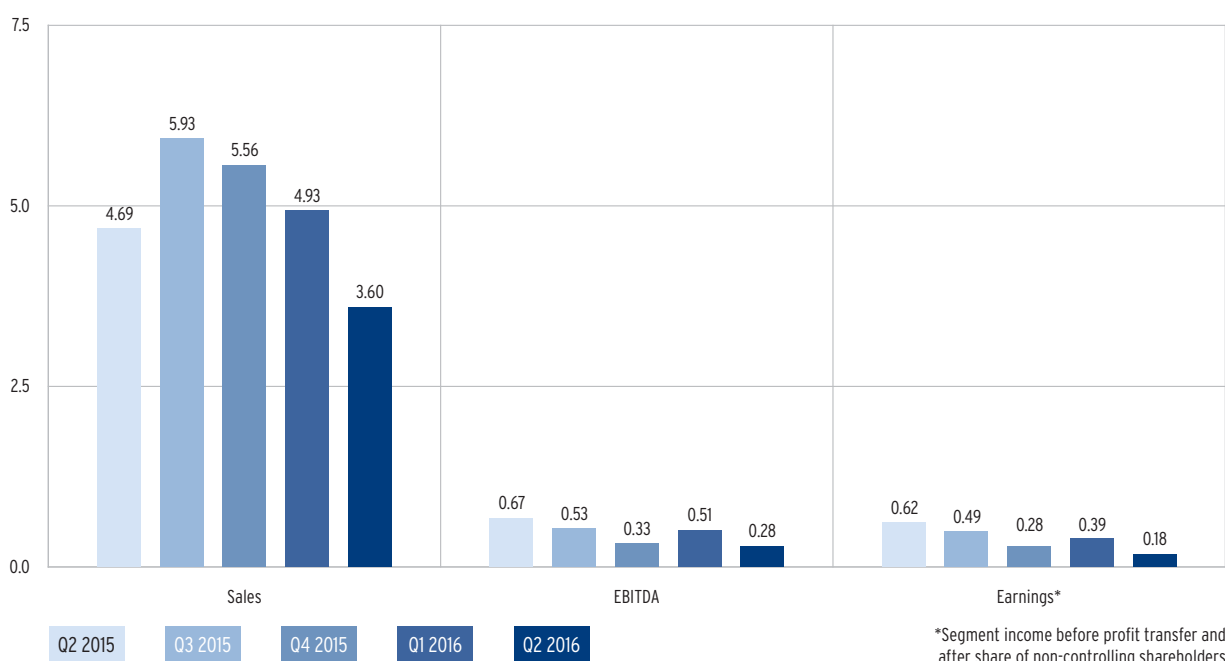
EBITDA

Taking into account much lower other operating expenses and almost unchanged personnel expenses compared to the same period last year, result in a declining EBITDA from EUR 1.30 million last year to EUR 0.79 million. Especially lower other operating income compared to the same period last year contributed to the lower EBITDA.

Segment earnings

Earnings of the segment ITC decreased in the first quarter compared to the same period last year from EUR 1.18 million by EUR 0.61 million to EUR 0.57 million. Overall, the segment ITC still generates a significant part of earnings for the 3U Group.

Segment Renewable Energies

Segment sales

In the segment Renewable Energies last year's sales of EUR 2.76 million were not quite maintained. The decline in sales to EUR 2.40 million in the first half of fiscal year 2016 was mainly due to lower feed-in tariffs from electricity generation from the wind farm Langendorf. However, this does not result from lower plant availability but solely from lower wind speeds at the site.

EBITDA

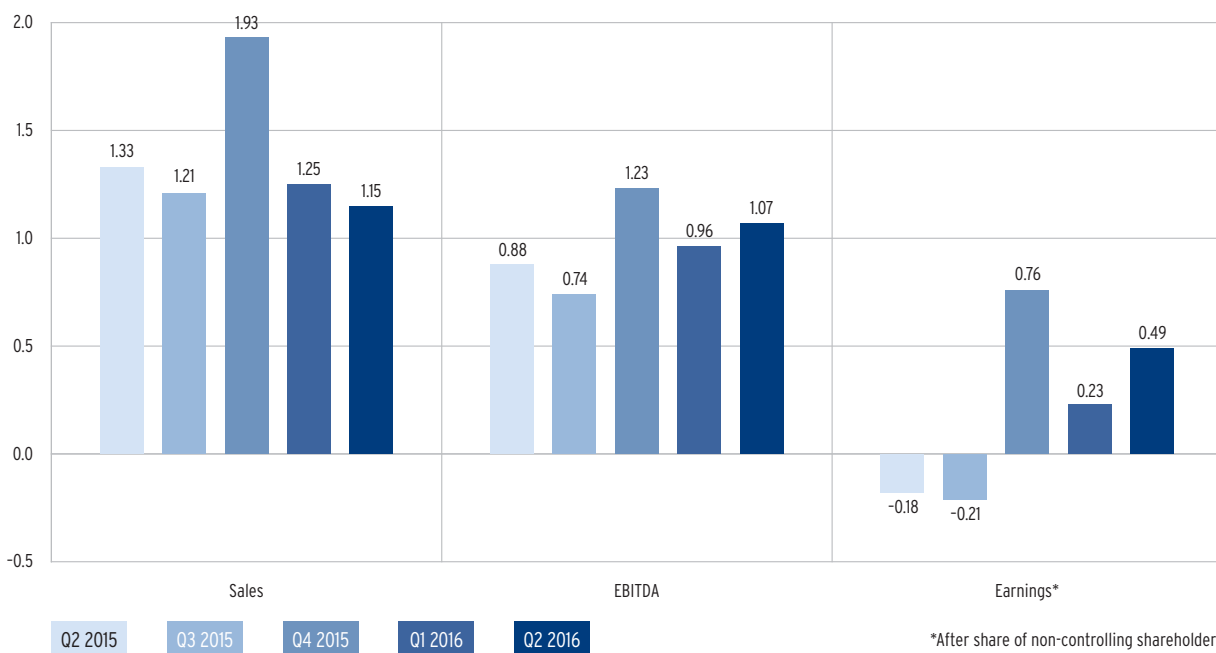
EBITDA increased from EUR 1.91 million in the same period last year to EUR 2.04 million in the first half of fiscal 2016. On a quarterly basis, EBITDA was slightly above the EBITDA of the first quarter of 2016 and slightly below the EBITDA of the fourth quarter of 2016. Weather-related fluctuations within this segment will occur in the future as well, because 3U depends with both the generation of electricity from solar energy as well as wind energy from the actual solar radiation and wind speed.

Segment earnings

Compared to the same period last year, segment earnings improved by EUR 0.80 million to EUR 0.72 million. Higher tax refunds compared to the same period last year have especially contributed.

Through the possibility of utilization of loss carry forwards resulted a tax benefit of EUR 0.26 million in the first six months of fiscal 2016. In the same period last year the tax expense amounted to EUR 0.12 million

Segment SHAC (Sanitary, Heating and Air Conditioning Technology)

Segment sales

In the segment SHAC sales increased from EUR 9.79 million to EUR 10.29 million. This increase in sales of EUR 0.50 million or 5.1% respectively was lower than planned. Sales in the assembly of components of air conditioning in buildings as well as in online trade were further expanded. The cost of materials ratio was reduced overall from 68.8% to 67.3%.

EBITDA

EBITDA improved from EUR 0.53 million last year to EUR 0.73 million in the first half of fiscal year 2016. This increase in EBITDA is a result of EUR 0.32 million higher gross profits compared to the same period last year and a slight decline in personnel expenses and an increase in other operating expenses in particular due to higher selling expenses.

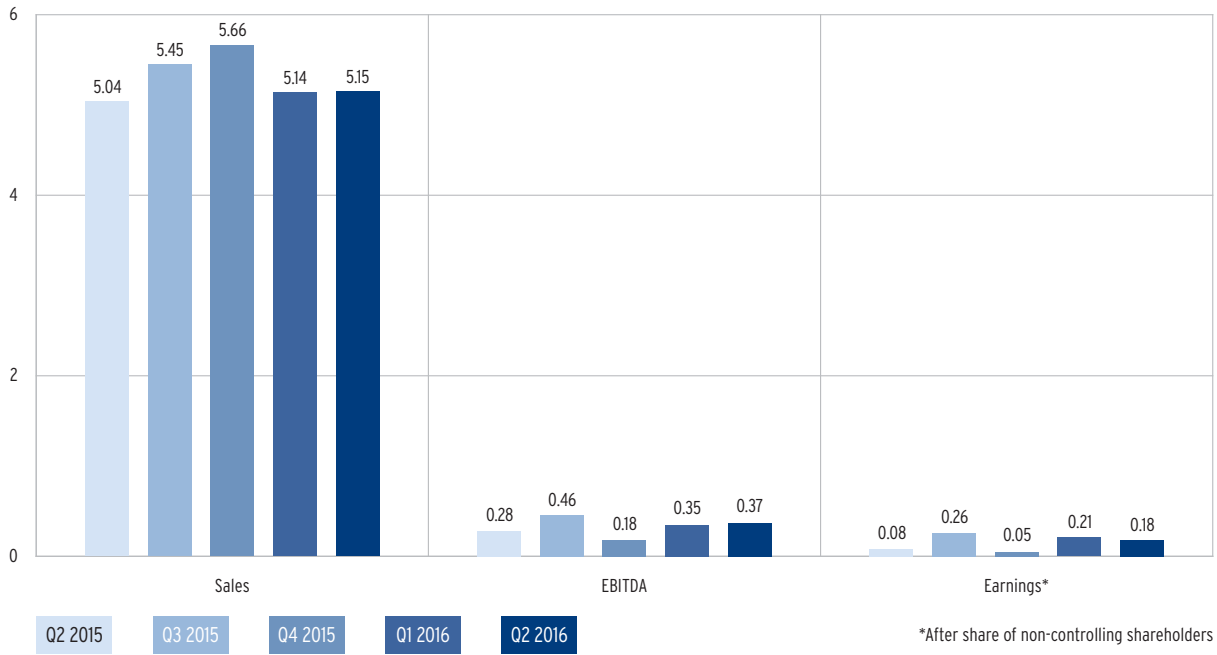
Segment earnings

Compared to the same period last year, segment earnings improved by EUR 0.25 million to EUR 0.39 million. Thus significant positive earnings were achieved in the segment. The mild weather in the first months of 2016 as well as favourable developments in the building industry have contributed to this end.

The tax expense for the first half of fiscal year 2016 amounted to EUR 0.16 million and was thus EUR 0.04 million higher than in the same period last year.

The income attributable to the non-controlling interests amounts to EUR 0.06 million (previous year period: EUR 0.15 million).

Holding/Consolidation

Holding activities together with the necessary Group consolidations are pooled in Holding/Consolidation.

Sales

Holding/Consolidation reported sales of EUR 0.08 million (previous year: EUR -0.14 million) in the reporting period. These comprise of the sales of the Holding in the amount of EUR 1.09 million (same period last year: EUR 0.85 million) and the sales consolidations in the amount of EUR -1.01 million (previous year: EUR -0.98 million). These sales consolidations result mainly from the consolidation of the sales between the segments as well as from the consolidation of services within the Group.

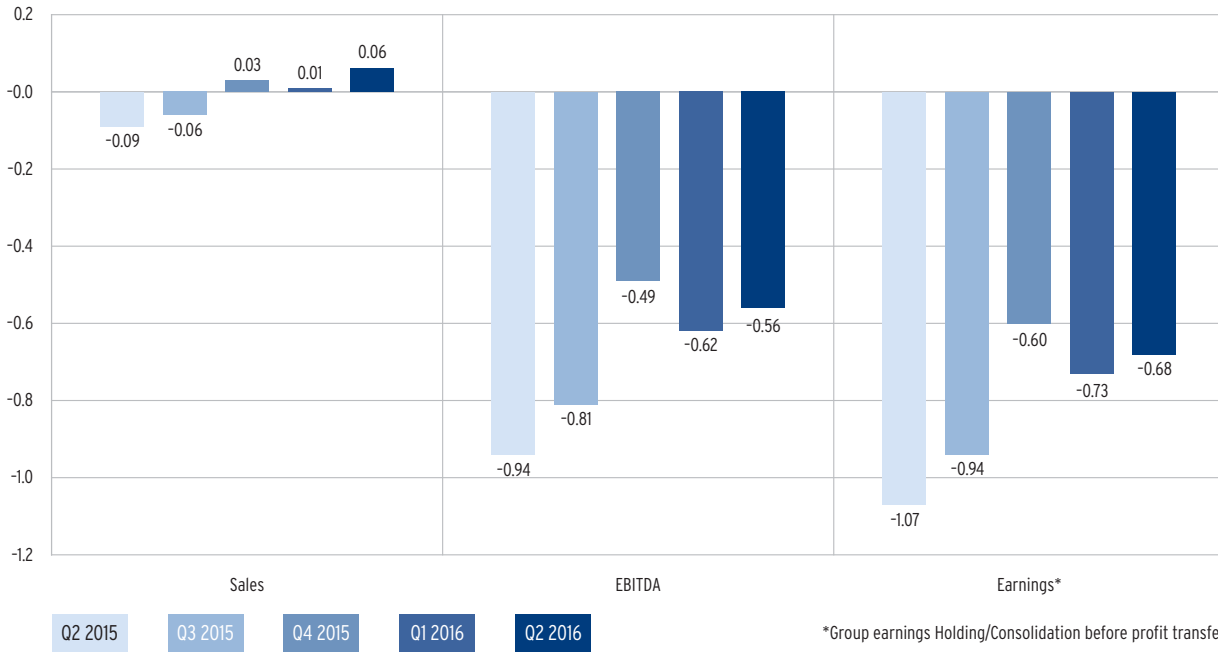
EBITDA

EBITDA amounts to EUR -1.19 million (previous year: EUR -1.91 million) and is substantially shaped by staff costs in the amount of EUR 1.47 million (previous year: EUR 1.63 million) and other operating income/expenses. Concerning personnel costs it has to be considered that employees from the finance, human resources and law sector as well as the group-wide marketing resources are assigned to the parent Company. Other operating expenses were burdened by one-off consulting expenses in the same period last year.

Earnings

Earnings from this area are negative for the Group with EUR -1.42 million, but are well above the level of the same period last year (EUR -2.14 million).

Financial position

Capital structure

In the first six months of fiscal 2016, the Group made payments for investments in the amount of EUR 10.44 million (previous year: EUR 0.42 million). The payments related mainly to investments in the construction of the wind farms Lüdersdorf.

3U HOLDING AG invests its financial portfolio exclusively in call accounts and current time deposits at the Baden-Württembergische Bank, at Sparkasse Marburg-Biedenkopf and at Deutsche Kreditbank AG.

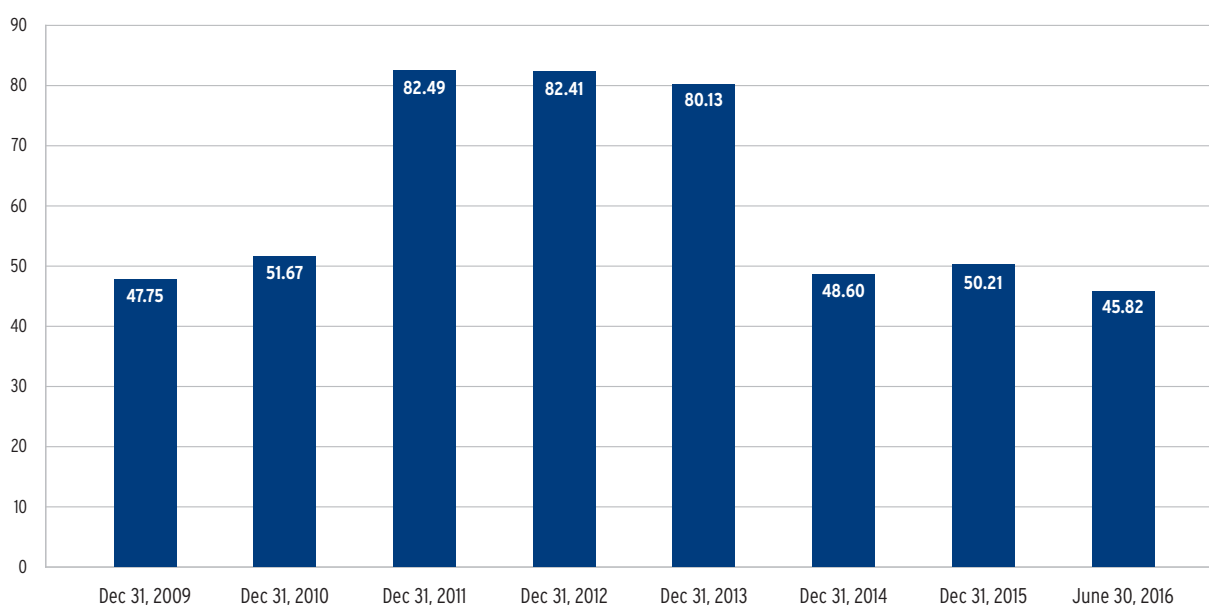
Compared with December 31, 2015, cash and cash equivalents have increased by EUR 0.71 million from EUR 7.70 million to EUR 8.41 million by June 30, 2016. This particular increase was mainly due to the funding extension for the solar park Adelebsen. As part of the completion of an additional loan agreement for the solar park the 3U Group accrued EUR 1.0 million.

For the long-term financing of the Windpark Lüdersdorf a loan agreement for a total loan amount of EUR 8.9 million has been completed, which has not yet been fully exploited as of June 30, 2016.

3U HOLDING AG continues to have a solid equity ratio. Due to the significantly higher total assets, the equity ratio with 45.82 % has declined compared to December 31, 2015 (50.21 %), while the absolute amount of equity was increased. The debt component is 54.18 % compared to 49.79 % as at December 31, 2015.

In addition to the earnings of the first half of fiscal 2016 in the amount of EUR 0.31 million (incl. the amounts attributable to non-controlling interests) only distributions to non-controlling interests in the amount of EUR 0.14 million have contributed to the change in equity.

Investments

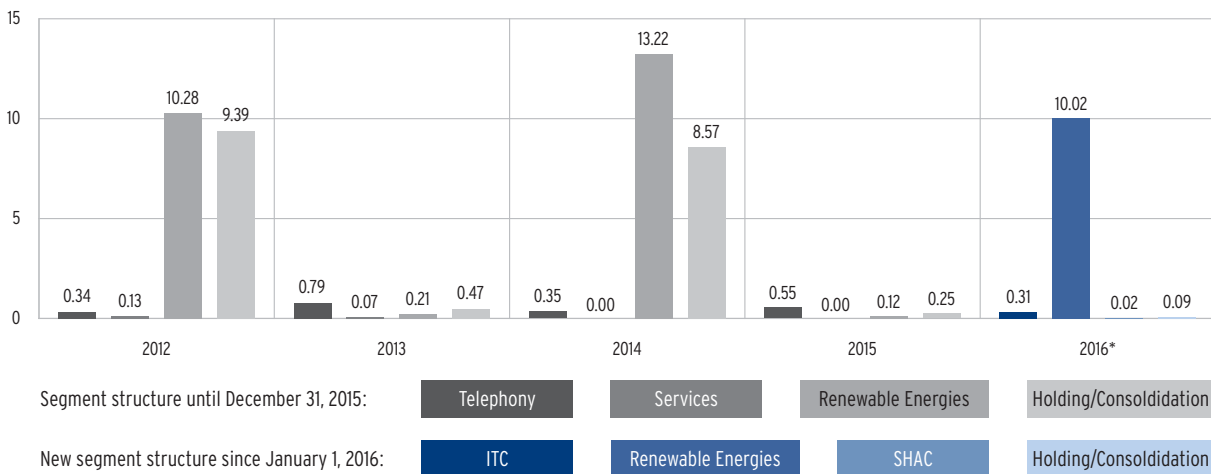
In the first half of fiscal 2016 investments in intangible assets and tangible fixed assets and investment property in the amount of EUR 10.44 million (period of the preceding year: EUR 0.42 million) were made within the Group.

EUR 0.31 million were invested in the segment ITC (period of the preceding year: EUR 0.33 million). The investments in the segment Renewable Energies add up to EUR 10.02 million resp. EUR 0.04 million in the period of the preceding year. In the segment SHAC only minor investments were made. Investments in tangible fixed assets and investment property of the holding company amounted to EUR 0.09 million in the first half of fiscal year 2016 (period of the preceding year: EUR 0.05 million).

The investments in the segment Renewable Energies mainly relate to investments in the establishment of the wind farm Lüdersdorf.

Investments of roughly EUR 14.38 million in the newly structured segments are planned for the financial year 2016. Of these, EUR 1.38 million will be invested in the segment ITC, EUR 12.01 million in the segment Renewable Energies, EUR 0.08 million in the segment SHAC and EUR 0.91 million within the Holding company.

Cash flow

Operating cash flow in the first six months of the business year 2016 amounted to EUR 3.32 million (same period previous year: EUR 0.03 million). Positive earnings for the period and the cash inflow from the reduction of inventories more than offset the cash outflow from the decrease in liabilities from goods and services. Cash flow from investing activities is dominated by a payment in connection with the construction of the wind farm Lüdersdorf. This includes the participation in the infrastructure company, which has taken over the construction of the cable system and the way area for the wind farm.

Cash flow from financing activities of EUR 7.78 million (previous year: EUR 7.20 million) contributed to the financing of investments. It resulted mainly from the inclusion of the financial loan for the wind farm Lüdersdorf and financing enlargement for the solar park Adelebsen. It was reduced through financing activities due to the repayment of existing loans.

The 3U Group was in a position to meet its payment obligations at all times in the reporting period and this is also guaranteed for 2016. The liquidity position is still comfortable at June 30, 2016. The financing of the project realization and the construction of the wind farm Lüdersdorf is ensured by a long-term bank loan amounting to EUR 8.9 million. In addition, sales tax payments in connection with the investments were financed by interim bank loans.

The following cash flow statement shows the change in cash and has been prepared in accordance with the Company's reported cash flows (without correction in funds).

Total assets as of June 30, 2016 amounts to EUR 84.54 million (December 31, 2015: EUR 76.82 million) and is thus EUR 7.72 million higher than at December 31, 2015. The causes for the changes compared to December 31, 2015 lie substantially in the higher fixed assets due to the investment in the establishment of the wind farms Lüdersdorf. This compares to only a slight decrease in current assets.

Fixed assets in the amount of EUR 60.46 million (December 31, 2015: EUR 51.78 million) comprises in addition to intangible assets (EUR 2.36 million resp. EUR 1.53 million at December 31, 2015) and fixed assets (EUR 50.14 million resp. EUR 42.16 million as at December 31, 2015) also the investment properties in the amount of EUR 7.79 million (December 31, 2015: EUR 7.90 million). These relate as in the previous year to the properties to be rented out in Adelebsen and Hanover.

Current assets of EUR 21.84 million as of June 30, 2016 are EUR 1.50 million lower than at December 31, 2015 (EUR 23.34 million). The proportion of liquid assets to current assets is 38.5 % (at December 31, 2015: 33.0 %). The decrease in inventories resulted primarily from the construction and operation of the wind farm Lüdersdorf. Another essential component of current assets are the demands for goods and services, which decreased on the reporting date to EUR 5.26 million from EUR 6.91 million as at December 31, 2015.

On the liabilities side, besides the rise of the financial liabilities primarily through the loan for the construction of the wind farm Lüdersdorf and by the expansion of the funding of the solar park material changes resulted from the increase in liabilities from goods and services.

The additional loan for the solar park Adelebsen was completed with the same maturity (December 30, 2030) as the original loan. Both loans operate basically the same collateral, however, the debt service reserve for both loans was reduced in the course of the loan extension from EUR 0.83 million to EUR 0.69 million. Additional collateral was not required.

For the long-term financing of the wind farm Lüdersdorf a loan agreement for a total loan in the amount of EUR 8.90 million was concluded. The loan has a term until June 30, 2034 and has been completed with a fixed rate. The loan repayment is done in equal quarterly instalments. The debt service reserve required for this loan will be saved from operating cash flow.

The high proportion of short-term debt results from the loan for the acquisition of the data center real estate in Hanover, which was concluded for only a short period.

The equity has increased slightly due to the positive half-year result compared to December 31, 2015.

General statement concerning the economic situation

The Management Board assesses the economic situation of the Company at the time of preparation of the Consolidated Management Report overall as satisfactory for the year. Thus, the 3U Group is on track to continue to improve the economic situation of the Group.

During the reporting period, both the operating result (EBITDA) and consolidated earnings improved significantly compared with the previous fiscal year. In the second quarter of 2016 positive earnings were achieved as in the previous quarter.

The segment ITC continues to perform very well and excelled planning in almost all key financial indicators. Only sales were lower than planned by about EUR 2.4 million. Compared to the planning, EBITDA and earnings before profit transfer were increased by around EUR 0.2 million.

On the sales level the segment Renewable Energies performed weaker than planned in the first half of fiscal 2016. Earnings in this segment were slightly better than planned.

In the segment SHAC planned sales were not entirely achieved. The sales differential of around EUR 1.3 million was more than offset by higher margins. As a result, with EUR 0.3 million this segment also reports earnings higher than planned.

Financial and non-financial performance indicators

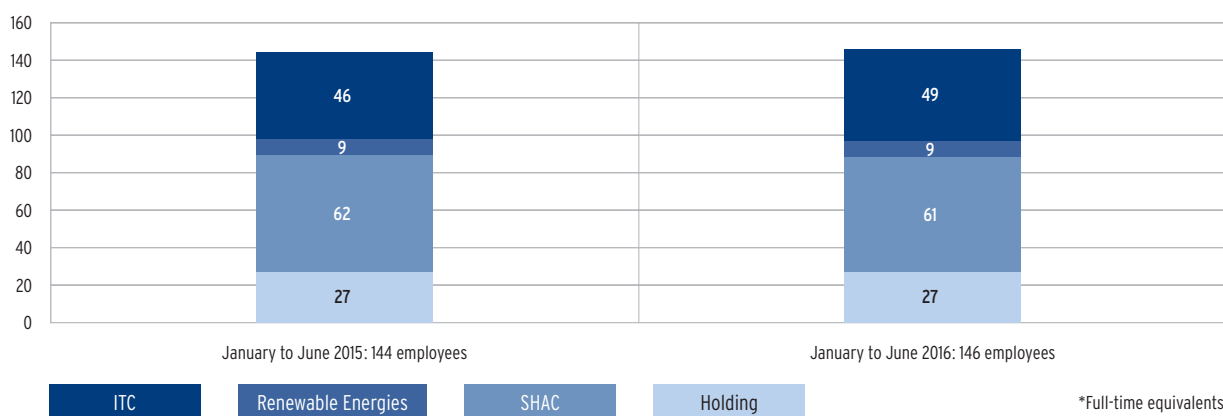
We use our group-wide financial performance indicators to set goals, to measure success and determine the variable compensation of executives. The most important financial performance indicators for us are sales, earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation and amortization (EBITDA) and profit after tax.

Non-financial performance indicators are not covered by regular reporting. Coordination and control are carried out between the Management Board and Managing Directors in direct consultations.

Highly qualified and motivated employees are the prerequisites for ensuring the success of a company in the long term. Responsible personnel development and continuous improvement play a decisive role. Therefore, sustainable development and targeted promotion of the potential of all employees is the core task of personnel management of the Company. Through targeted personnel development the Company wants to increase its attractiveness as an employer and thereby further increase the employees' identification with the 3U Group and their commitment to its objectives.

Staff*

On the financial statement date the 3U Group employed 145 people (June 30, 2015: 144). The yearly average was 146 (previous year: 144). The average number of employees in the individual divisions is made up as follows:



Our employees contribute decisively with their ideas to greater efficiency and competitiveness. Therefore, a cooperative communication climate in the Group is encouraged, as all employees are motivated to make suggestions for the optimization of products and processes, to synergies and other improvements within the Group. The remuneration system is broken down into fixed and variable elements depending on the job, so that superior performance can be rewarded accordingly.

Promoting employee health

We understand health as defined by the World Health Organization (WHO) as psychic, physical and social wellbeing. To preserve and promote the health of our employees, we have implemented selective measures in the Group. Thus the Group supports the health care of its employees. Employees also have the opportunity to attend internal and external training and educational events. Their bond with 3U is reinforced by a series of measures in which social aspects are at center-stage.

Safety in the workplace is enhanced by appropriate training. As in previous years, no employees were significantly harmed by an accident at work in 2016.

Corporate Responsibility

Impact of our business on the environment

The perception of corporate social responsibility is an integral part of our corporate strategy. We consider systematically the various interests of our stakeholders and the impact of our business on the environment. We are looking for a balance between economic objectives and social responsibility. With our increased commitment to renewable energies and the expansion of the segment SHAC through efficient solutions for avoiding energy, we are actively investing in the environment and thus show social commitment. In the other divisions we increasingly rely on the use of renewable energies as well. We try to consider environmental aspects when buying products and services.

Related parties report

There were no extraordinary changes or developments in business relations with related parties in the first six months of the current financial year as against December 31, 2015. Please refer to our presentation in the Annual Report 2015. All transactions with related parties were conducted at arm's length.

Report on risks and opportunities

As of June 30, 2016 there were no material changes in risks and their assessment as reported in detail in the Annual Report 2015.

Significant events since the end of the interim reporting period

Significant events after the end of this interim financial period did not occur.

Forecasting report

Economic outlook

At the beginning of 2016 it became clear that the world economy had cooled down markedly in the preceding months. This was largely due to rapid structural change in China. This process entails significant economic risks and is accompanied by a decline in foreign trade's importance to China, as well as weaker demand for commodities.

The gloomier economic outlook and decline in oil prices led to a further slowdown in the global price dynamic. This prompted recourse to additional, unconventional fiscal policy measures in the euro area and Japan, which will further stimulate economic activity. In Britain and the USA central banks are more cautious about their announced policy turnaround.

In the meantime there are growing signs that international economic activity will not weaken any further in 2016. In advanced economies in particular the dynamic has already gained momentum slightly. According to the leading economic Institutes, world production will expand this year at around the same moderate pace as last year. This will mean growth of 2.4 % in 2016 and of 2.8 % in 2017.

The German economy is experiencing a moderate upturn. Against a background of sustained employment growth, sizeable wage increases and purchasing power gains thanks to lower energy prices, private consumption is driving the upturn. All in all, gross domestic product is expected to rise by 1.6 % this year and by 1.5 % in 2017

The positive development in the labour market is expected to continue over the rest of the forecasting period. The labour force will grow by 500,000 persons on average this year and by around 390,000 persons in 2017. As in previous years, migration will more than compensate for the decline in the working population due to demographics. Moreover, the availability of refugees in the German labour market will also make itself increasingly felt over the forecasting period. Unemployment will edge upwards as a result, despite employment growth. However, the average unemployment rate of 6.2 % this year and 6.4 % in 2017 will remain almost unchanged.

Outlook ITC

Sales in the total market of telecommunications services in Germany have been declining for many years. This development is based on strong sales decreases in the land-line sector and moderate decreases in the market of mobile telephony. Thus a displacement market prevails in the telecommunications industry, which is shaped by innovations and technical progress, but above all is characterized by a further price decline due also to the pronounced competitive situation. The strong fluctuations of the call-by-call market make a medium-term market forecast difficult.

Government interventions – launched nationally as well as by the EU – have a significant impact on the call-by-call market. Therefore, a medium-term market forecast is difficult. As in previous years, the market is likely to shrink, according to the inter-trade organization VATM. Against this background, the Management Board expects a continuously declining development analogous to the market development in the business year 2016.

Generally increasing investment in data centers can be expected for the future. According to researchers like IDC, Gartner or A. T. Kearney, investments in data centers will rise sharply. According to A. T. Kearney the European data center market is to grow by more than 6 % annually and reach a volume of EUR 270.4 billion by 2020. This market addressed the 3U Group with its portfolio DCS (Data Center Services).

The 3U Group will continue to pursue its strategy to recognise and occupy profitable niches in the area Telephony. In particular, the offered services concerning data centers are to be developed further and should develop into an important pillar. The market environment remains very competitive. To what extent the new areas can compensate for the decline in sales and the resulting decrease in income from the call-by-call business is difficult to predict.

A promising market is addressed with the topics of cloud computing and IT Security as well as business consulting. In cloud computing, IT services are provided in the right quantities and flexible in real-time as a service via the Internet and billed according to use. In cloud computing various technical improvements and innovations converge and create the potential for a base innovation in the business field. Cost reduction, cost structure changes, cost variability, flexibility and entirely new business models are other important arguments. It is expected that cloud computing will change the entire information economy, its technologies and its business and therefore the relationship between suppliers and consumers for the long term. With a rapid adoption of cloud computing in business, the demand for technical infrastructure expertise decreases. For software vendors the traditional licensing business will shift in the direction of "Software as a Service" (SaaS).

For users cloud computing has many advantages. Thus, for example, investments become variable costs. It is expected that almost all companies will use cloud computing in a few years – at least complementary.

IT security assumes an increasingly important role in almost every company. Both large corporations as well as small and medium sized companies are exposed daily to attacks from the internet which can cause immense and costly damage. Above all, when placing an order or awarding contracts in an area where larger amounts of (personal) data is collected, IT security is a high or highest concern. Therefore, products and services as well as IT security licenses for a comprehensive IT security management meet a growing demand. Nearly every company must take daily risks. Some risks have the potential to jeopardize the success of a company seriously. These include IT risks, risks due to non-compliance with legal requirements, personnel risks, market risks etc. However, with the help of a suitable risk management system one can adequately respond to these risks and opportunities. Therefore, a durable high demand should also be expected in this area.

Market experts attest good growth prospects for Cloud Computing, Software as a Service, Data Center Services, IT services and consulting services. In these business areas, the Management Board of 3U HOLDING AG expects further rising sales in 2016, while revenue in the telephony will continue to decline.

Outlook Renewable Energies

The importance of renewable energies as an economic factor is increasing not only in Germany, but also globally. With the segment Renewable Energies, the Group participates in the progressive change in energy sustainability and the trend towards resource saving and thus improving energy efficiency.

The Group plans to realize other renewable energy projects. The conditions are largely determined in this segment by the Renewable Energies Sources Act (EEG). With the reform to the EEG (Renewable Energies Act) of August 2014, the Grand Coalition submitted the framework, which gives all parties planning reliability until the end of 2016. The EEG 2017 adopted on July 8, 2016 is heralding the next phase, which is tantamount to a paradigm shift: From 2017 the compensation amount of renewable electricity is not as previously fixed by the state, but determined by tender on the market. This reform of the Renewable Energies Act shall enter into force on January 1, 2017. 3U focuses to expand its wind power activities – this concerns both planning & project development and investments in wind farms and their operation – in an area that still has a good risk/reward profile. The further development in this area depends on various factors which are hard to predict today. We follow the activities of all relevant market participants very closely and will position ourselves accordingly.

While the project business is relatively volatile, very stable and predictable sales and earnings are achieved by the renewable energy generation.

Outlook SHAC

The activities around the topic of heating, cooling and ventilation of buildings further evolve encouraging. A number of developments have a positive impact here. Firstly, the construction activity will remain at a high level for the foreseeable future due to the low interest rates, resulting in a corresponding demand for HVAC products and their installation. In addition policy makers require increasing energy efficiency in buildings. This leads to a substantial demand for replacement investments especially in the business area heating and air conditioning. Finally, we benefit in this segment of the demand shift towards online trading. Currently only a small fraction of the products from the HVAC sector is in demanded online in Germany. However, this proportion is growing at a rate of nearly 30 % p. a. With our online trading activities, we want to grow faster than the market. With the already existing different business units within this segment the 3U Group is promising positioned.

Strategic direction

Lasting operative profitability in the segments is the top priority for the Group. In recent years and especially in 2015, we have achieved significant progress in this regard.

In the segment ITC the earnings levels is to be defended. Scheduled declines in the business area Telephony should be offset and at a later stage overcompensated by the newer business fields.

While we intend to mainly grow the segment SHAC organically, our strategy in the segment Renewable Energies is to grow inorganically as well.

With its investment strategy, the 3U Group pursues a strategy to retain successful businesses in the long term, but also to sell them if attractive offers arise.

Outlook 3U Group

After a generally satisfactory first half the Management Board of 3U HOLDING AG remains confident to meet the annual targets for 2016 as published in the most recent quarterly report for fiscal 2016, the Management Board expects sales between EUR 54 million and EUR 60 million, EBITDA of EUR 6.0 million and EUR 8.0 million and net earnings of between EUR 0.5 million and EUR 2.5 million. It should be noted that a large proportion of the earnings contribution by the segment Renewable Energy is planned for the fourth quarter.

The partial or entire sale of Subsidiaries belongs to the corporate purpose of 3U HOLDING AG and can lead to positive special effects. In addition, 3U HOLDING AG plans to grow inorganically through acquisitions. However, there are limitations to plan resulting effects.

The goal of all activities is to enhance the value of the 3U Group sustainably for the shareholders, but also for our employees. The success of those efforts will be reflected in a positive price trend for the 3U share. With regard to the estimates and expectations presented, we point out that the actual future events can differ significantly from our expectations concerning the probable development.

General information about the Group

3U HOLDING AG (subsequently also referred to as 3U or Company), headquartered in Marburg, is the holding company of the 3U Group and a listed stock corporation. It is registered with the Marburg Main District Court and has since been registered in the Register of Companies there, under HRB number 4680.

The business activities of 3U HOLDING AG and its Subsidiaries comprise besides the management of its own assets also the provision of telecommunication services and IT services in the segment ITC. Activities in the field of renewable energy and in the field of sanitary, heating and air conditioning are represented in the segments Renewable Energies and SHAC.

The segments were reorganized as of January 1, 2016. The presentation of the comparative figures have been adjusted accordingly.

The address of the registered office of the Company is: Frauenbergstraße 31-33, 35039 Marburg, Germany.

Accounting principles

The interim financial report was prepared in accordance with the provisions of the International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS).

The present interim report has not been reviewed by auditors.

Supplementary disclosures in accordance with IAS 34

The accounting policies and methods of calculation used in the consolidated financial statements as of December 31, 2015 were applied unchanged for the interim statements as of June 30, 2016.

For details of the order situation and the development of costs and prices please refer to the section "Report on business development" in the interim Group management report.

For details to the number of employees please refer to the section "Staff" in the interim Group management report.

For details to significant events since the end of the interim reporting period we refer to the section "Significant events since the end of the interim reporting period" in the interim Group management report.

There were no extraordinary developments in business with related parties and the Company in the first six months of the fiscal year 2016 as against the previous year. For information about individual business relations, please refer to our Annual Report of December 31, 2015, Section 8.3.

Scope of consolidation

Compared to December 31, 2015, no changes have occurred in the scope of consolidation.

The consolidated financial statements of 3U HOLDING AG as of June 30, 2016 include besides 3U HOLDING AG 22 (December 31, 2015: 22) German and foreign Subsidiaries, in which 3U directly or indirectly holds the majority of the voting rights resp. has the ability to control.

14 (December 31, 2015: 14) subsidiaries whose influence is both individually and collectively immaterial to the financial condition and results of operations are not consolidated. These are essentially non-active companies. They are valued at cost and reported under non-current assets.

Segment reporting

In accordance with the regulations of IFRS 8, business segments, the segment reporting of 3U HOLDING AG applies the “Management Approach” regarding segment identification.

The information that is regularly made available to the Management Board and Supervisory Board is therefore regarded to be relevant for the segment presentation.

According to the amended internal reporting compared to the fiscal year 2015, 3U covers the segments ITC, Renewable Energies, SHAC and Holding/Consolidation within its segment reporting.

The segment ITC comprises the activities Voice Retail, Business Voice and Data Center Services & Operation as well as the development, distribution and operation of cloud based CRM and ERP solutions, the trading of IT licenses and consulting concerning management systems based on ISO 27001 as well as IT security.

In the segment Renewable Energies the 3U Group essentially covers the wind power project development and electricity generation with own plants using wind and solar energy.

In addition to the assembly of components of air conditioning in buildings, the distribution of products from sanitary, heating and air conditioning systems to wholesalers, craftsmen and self-builders belong to the segment SHAC. This distribution is carried out via the Group’s online stores.

Besides the aforementioned segments, Holding activities as well as the necessary Group consolidating entries are summarised under Holding/Consolidation.

Segment reporting follows the intra-segment consolidation, while the inter-segment consolidation occurs on holding level. The presentation of the comparative figures have been adjusted accordingly.

A detailed description of the segments is available in the interim Group management report in the business performance presentation.
